

FLUORESCEIN ANGIOGRAM INFORMATION SHEET

- A specialized photographer will do this procedure with the assistance and supervision of your ophthalmologist.
- The total time that your appointment will take is one hour for color photos only, and an additional half hour for Fluorescein Angiogram.
- You may eat and drink normally on the day of the procedure. If at all possible, you should not wear contact lenses 24 hours prior to the procedure.
- If having Fluorescein Angiogram:
 - 1. Wear a loose fitting blouse or shirt.
 - 2. Your eyes will be dilated. Since your eyes will be dilated for two to four hours afterwards, we advise that you do not drive after the procedure.
 - 3. A doctor, registered nurse, or other authorized personnel (e.g., certified photographer) will inject dye into a vein in your arm during the procedure.
 - 4. A series of photographs will be taken through the pupils of your eyes.
- You should notify your ophthalmologist if you have any history of the following: 1)
 Allergies, 2) Asthma, and 3) Reaction to dye
- The following side effects commonly occur with the injection of Fluorescein dye:
 - 1. Your urine will vary from a bright orange to yellow green for 24 to 48 hours after the procedure.
 - 2. Light complexion skin will take on a yellowish hue for 6 to 12 hours after the procedure.
- The following reaction may occasionally occur (5% of the population) with the injection of Fluorescein dye: 1) Nausea, 2) Fainting, 3) Headache.
- The following side effects of Fluorescein dye injection are very rare: 1) Anaphylactic reaction to dye, 2) Vomiting.
- This procedure is not recommended for pregnant women or nursing mothers.
